## Easley numbers tank

**Raleigh, N.C.** – Suffering from a recent drumbeat of bad publicity, Mike Easley's poll numbers have now sunk into John Edwards territory.

Only 16% of North Carolinians say they have a favorable opinion of Easley, with 59% expressing a negative opinion of him. Last month PPP found a similar percentage of voters in the state- 15%- with a positive view of Edwards, although Edwards' negatives at 72% are still a good deal higher than Easley's. That's because a lot more respondents offer no opinion about Easley than Edwards.

Majorities of Democrats, Republicans, and independents all express unfavorable feelings toward Easley. His numbers are best within his own party at 22/50, followed by a 16/60 spread with independents, and a 9/70 one with GOP voters.

Interestingly Easley's numbers are at their worst level in the Triangle, despite it being the most Democratic part of the state. It's also the section where Easley's recent troubles have drawn the largest amount of attention and 71% of voters there have a dim view of the former Governor.

A majority of every demographic subgroup that PPP tracks with the exception of blacks, voters under 30, and folks who live in the mountains has a negative opinion of Easley.


"There is not a state in the country that likes its politicians less than North Carolina," said Dean Debnam, President of Public Policy Polling. "The state's voters give their sitting officials bad marks, but it's nothing compared to how much they dislike their former ones like Easley and Edwards."

PPP surveyed 788 North Carolina voters from February 12<sup>th</sup> to 15th. The survey's margin of error is +/-3.5%. Other factors, such as refusal to be interviewed and weighting, may introduce additional error that is more difficult to quantify.

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
