
5 Important Facts About NC Hispanics and Latinos














2010 North Carolina Population by Race




North Carolina Population by Race: 1990 - 2010







Population Changes 1990 -2010




Change in Hispanic or Latino Population by County, 2000-2010












Percent Population Changes in Top 5 Counties




Total Hispanic or Latino Population by County, 2000

Change in Hispanic or Latino Population by County, 2000-2010










Hispanic/Latino Pop Changes

Percent Hispanic or Latino Population by County, 2010




Percent Change in Hispanic or Latino Population by County, 2000-2010




2000 – 2010 Fastest County Growth



NC Negative Growth Counties: 2000-2010





NC Hispanic/Latino Economic Strength

- In 2009 Hispanic/Latino purchasing power in NC was \$282 million (\$189 million in 2000)
 - Projected to be \$346 million by 2014

Latino Purchasing Power (US), 2000 to 2010


In 2010, about \$1,100 billion. In 2000, about \$775 billion (in 2010 prices).

Increase from 2000 to 2010 is about 40% compared with about 16% for the U.S. overall.

Share of U.S. purchasing power is up from about 7% in 2000 to about 9% in 2010.

Principal source of increase is growth in population.

According to the 2007 Economic Census Survey of NC Business Owners: Hispanic Owned Businesses (released September 2010)

21,301 firms (2.7%) in North Carolina are Hispanic Owned with \$4.2 billion in receipts or .5% of the total business receipts of the state

According to the 2007 Economic Census Survey of NC Business Owners: Hispanic Owned Businesses (released September 2010)

Of the 21,301 Hispanic Owned NC businesses, 36.9% are Mexican/Mexican American/Chicano owned, 9.3% are Puerto Rican owned, and 43.5% are Other Hispanic, Latino or Spanish owned

According to the 2007 Economic Census Survey of NC Business Owners: Hispanic Owned Businesses (released September 2010)

Of the \$4.2 billion in Hispanic Owned business receipts, 32.7% were Mexican/Mexican American/Chicano owned, 8.4% are Puerto Rican owned, and 41.6% are Other Hispanic, Latino or Spanish owned

In 2007, there were over 21,301 small businesses owned by Hispanic/Latino Individuals

- Employed almost 34,000 Individuals
- 2,265 Employer Firms (17,165 Employees)


Hispanic/Latino Growth in NC: Labor FORCE and the Future

Constraints on Hispanic Entrepreneurs

Access to information about the legal and commercial aspects of business ownership

Complex applications, legal forms, and elaborate government reporting requirements to start a business

Access to credit/financing and insurance coverage

Addressing Constraints on Hispanic Entrepreneurs

Create a "one-stop" source for resources and information

Access to translations of forms and information that are linguistically and culturally accurate

More easily understood, transparent, and discernable requirements for business formation and taxes involved

Greater accessibility to credit/capital and insurance information/requirements
